Featured Keynote Speaker: Kim M. Cecil, PhD | Professor of Radiology, Pediatrics, Neuroscience and Environmental Health, Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center

Lead Astray: The Importance of Healthy Homes

How exactly does lead damage the brains of the over 800 children poisoned by this toxic substance in New Hampshire each year? The Cincinnati Lead Study (CLS), the longest running longitudinal study of the long-term negative impact of childhood lead exposure in the world, answers these questions. Dr. Kim Cecil of Cincinnati Children's Hospital, lead researcher for CLS, will review the outcomes for study participants as they were followed into adulthood. MRI brain-scans of participants detail the undeniable reality of how lead exposure damages children's brains in areas critical for learning and behavior, causing a lifetime of consequences. Learn why healthy home environments, free of lead paint hazards, are vitally important to supporting the health of New Hampshire's children and communities.
